CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting convened at 8:30 a.m., with Chairman Saito presiding. He welcomed everyone and went over the anti-trust agreement.

MINUTES

MOTION: Commissioner Bitter made a motion to approve the January 23, 2024, minutes. Commissioner Darrington seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.



FINANCIAL REPORT: Mr. Higham discussed receipts and expenditures for the February financials. For the month of February, Fresh revenue is at \$357k, up \$15k compared to last year. Processed is at \$625k, down \$418k. Total for the month of February is \$982k, down \$402k compared to last year. Year-to-date for Fresh is up \$1.8 mil compared to last year and Processed is up \$1.4 mil. compared to the previous year. Total Year-to-date for Fresh and Processed is up \$3.2 mil. Expenditures for the month of February are \$862k vs \$1.2 mil budget. Currently the reserve is \$3.1 mil. Chairman Saito asked for a motion to approve the February financials as presented if there were no further questions.

MOTION: Commissioner Darrington made a motion to approve the February financials. Commissioner Jemmett seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

<u>CHAIRMANS COMMITTEE:</u> Chairman Saito called upon Mr. Eaton, who presented the following: A) Sponsorships/Donation Bill; B) Pesticide Bill will not go through; C) Commissioner Training; D) Open Meeting Law 74-201; E) Reimbursement & Travel Policy for IPC Commissioners and Staff.

RESEARCH & EDUCATION: Commissioner Jemmett turned time over to Mr. Blacker who reported on the Research and Education Budget proposal and motion.

MOTION: Commissioner Jemmett made a motion to approve the \$649,217 Consortium Funds and \$233,629 of Idaho Only Projects with a total R&E Budget of \$882,846. Commissioner Bitter seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

LIASON REPORTS:

POTATOES USA: Commissioner Bitter turned time over to Kim Breshears who reported on the following: A) Shelly Olsen, new Chairperson; B) Board appointments have not been made; C) Committee Structure is new; D) "Dirty Dozen" Potatoes were not on the top 10 list, but #22 and have been off over 10 years now; E) Exports are up in Mexico; F) Japan update with "Fresh Table Stock" as first potatoes they have to conduct an audit on; G) Consumer Attitudes, 8th year potatoes are America's Favorite Vegetable.

IACI: Commissioner Saito turned the time over to John Eaton who reported on the



following: A) Legislative Session ended in Idaho & appropriation of bills; B) Tax Cut Bill & School Funding Bill; D) Income Tax, Corporate Tax updates; E) Pesticide Bill and Round up lawsuits.

<u>SIPCO:</u> Commissioner Darrington turned time over to Patxi who reported on the following: A) Contracts negotiated in early December with Lamb Weston, McCain, and Simplot; B) 3 Approved contacts with processors after reviewing and negotiating with growers; C) Auto grader technology and presentation March 6 at the Burley Inn that went over new grading abilities.

Other Items:

<u>Washington Potato Summit Leaf Program:</u> Commissioner Telford went over leadership program and the need for younger generations given the anti-Ag sediment in the state is increasing.

<u>Doug Jones:</u> Political problem with Ag support and very little Ag representation in the legislative.
